Stamm Parent Involvement = Stamm Student Success!



Research reveals many benefits when parents are involved in their child's education, including higher grades and test scores; better attitudes and behavior; better school attendance; more homework completed; greater likelihood of graduating from high school; and a better chance of enrolling in postsecondary education.

Showing an interest in your child's education, setting high expectations for achievement, and letting your child know you believe in his or her abilities promotes positive growth and achievement.

Parents can reinforce the importance of school by speaking positively about their children's teachers and counselors. Making sure your child gets to school on time also conveys importance of punctuality. At Stamm School the first minutes of the day are crucial for setting the schedule and tone for the entire day. By attending open houses and parent teacher conferences and by answering notes and calls from teachers children will see how parents value their education as well.

Parents can strengthen their connection with school by reading the Stamm Newsletter that is distributed at the beginning of each month. Stamm can also use help with its Parent Teacher Organization. Stamm's active PTO plans the Annual Chili Supper and other worthwhile events. Parents can also get to know their children's teachers and can spend time at Stamm as a volunteer or visitor. In doing this, parents can see directly how their child is doing with class work and how their child interacts with other children. If parents cannot spend time at Stamm because of work or other commitments, they can still connect from home by offering to call other parents to notify them of school events or by helping with the school newsletter.

By getting involved in their child's education, parents will promote the building of a bridge between the home and school. Stamm will do its very best to ensure that EVERY parent feels welcome and valued for ultimately, we know that parental involvement is more important to student success than any other factor.

Curriculum Update

Ohio Achievement Test Parent reports will be sent home with students the first week of school for all students in grades 3-5 last school year. Parents of students who were in grades 6-8 last year will receive the parent reports with their school's first newsletter.

Teachers met this summer and previewed four sets of Foreign Language materials. *Realidades* for Spanish and *TPR Storytelling* for French will provide updated teaching resources to enhance the learning experience. New Government textbooks and Economic resources will be ready for the Senior Government students replacing very out-dated books. There will be additional textbook studies in other curricular areas as the school year begins.

Healthy at Hayes

Throughout the year, the third-grade has held healthy snack sales each month in order to earn money for The Kids on the Block puppet show. The puppets are operated by two puppeteers, Brenda Engle and Kay Barbour from Holland, Ohio. These ladies travel to schools in 13 counties of Northwest Ohio.



Each character is a child with a different disability. One puppet is blind and shows the students how he uses Braille to read and can even play baseball with a special beeping ball. Another puppet explains how she is cognitively delayed and works at a veterinarian's office through a school-to-work transitional program.



Eagle TV at Lutz

Every year at the beginning of the school year, Lutz Elementary School has try-outs for its Eagle TV News Show. Children in sixth grade can compete for the anchor positions, 5th graders compete for the sports/weather positions, 4th graders compete for teleprompter positions, and finally, all students in grades 5 and 6 can compete to be camera operators.

Once selected, children are put into teams and are on-air for a week at a time. They are responsible for arriving to school early and preparing for the day's broadcast. Each morning at 9:00 AM all classrooms are tuned in to watch the morning news. At the end of the school year, Lutz has an award ceremony.

At this ceremony, Emmy awards are given to the outstanding anchor and sports/weather person. During the 2007-08 school year, Bryce Dukeshire was voted by the teachers as the outstanding anchor and Peri Weaver was the outstanding sports/weather person. Children are learning valuable skills by participating in this activity. All children enjoy watching Eagle TV daily.

Tips for Parents: Starting the New School Year Right

The beginning of a new school year can be the start of a journey toward success if parents, students and teachers work together. Here are some suggestions from National Education Association for parents who want to help their child start the new school year right.

The First Day Jitters

Start talking now about the upcoming school year and the first day of classes. Discuss what to expect on the first day—catching up with old friends and meeting new ones, learning classroom rules and finding out what's ahead. Take note of how you feel about your child going off to school. If you're anxious, try not to let it show!

If you're new to the area, take time to visit the school before classes begin. Walk, drive or show your child the bus route to familiarize him or her with the trip to school.

A Place of One's Own

Whether it's a bedroom desk or the kitchen table, every child needs a regular place to study and complete homework. This area should be well lit and equipped with school supplies like paper, pencils and a dictionary. Siblings should respect the time set aside for studying and not distract the child who is doing homework.

Kids (and Parents) Love Routines

Set aside a specific time for studying every night. Discuss with your child what time of day would work best; right after school? Just before dinner? Immediately following dinner? If your child attends an after-school program, find out if students will be expected to do homework there. If your child completes homework assignments away from home, plan to review the work at a set time every night. If homework has already been completed, have the child use study time for reading or reviewing problem areas.

Create High Expectations

To learn, children must believe that they can learn. As the parent, you are the most important adult in your child's life. The feedback you give your child—what you say and do about his or her abilities—will have a lasting impact on your child's self-confidence. Be encouraging and praise your child for the amount of effort that he puts into a project. Let her know that doing her best is what counts.

Reading Can Be Contagious

Research shows that children who are read to in their early years do better in school. Make reading a habit in your home, for both you and your child. Each night before bed, read to your child for at least 20 minutes. If the child is learning to read, ask him or her to read to you. For older children, set 30 minutes aside each night for family reading time when everyone reads together silently. Keep plenty of reading materials available—books, magazines and newspapers. Let your kids see you reading and they're more likely to pick up the habit.

Schools + Communities = Success

To be effective, schools need the support of parents and the community. Find out key dates during the year when there will be opportunities for you to participate in school events. Mark your family calendar and your personal date book now to hold those dates.

Look for specific ways that you can support your child's school. Volunteer a few hours a week in the classroom. Offer to speak to your child's class (or others) about a special hobby or area of expertise. Encourage a local business to adopt your child's school. Join the PTA to ensure that you have a voice in the work of the school. Offer to help with a special school project. Organize a school beautification day.

Thanks to the Permanent Improvement dollars levied for the district, building improvements continued over the summer of 2008. Fremont Ross has a new Duro-Last roof that was installed by Damschroder Construction. Sidewalks were also replaced at the various locations of the Ross campus. This work was completed by Smith Paving of Norwalk. Mosser Construction reduced the chimney at Fremont Middle School and completed tuckpointing and an overhang repair at Stamm Elementary. Tile work, completed by Bower Tiling Service of Clyde, was performed at Atkinson Elementary. M&B Asphalt of Old Fort repaired/replaced catch basins in the Hayes Elementary parking lot.

New Director of Student Services



“The only thing constant is change” has new meaning for the special education department in Fremont City Schools. With a new Director on board and the increased need for special education and general education to collaborate to serve all students, many things will look different in 2008-09. Tim Cullen, a Fremont native, is now the Director of Student Services for Fremont City Schools. “Student Services” truly describes the comprehensive nature that this department addresses on a daily basis through direct instruction, interventions, collaborative teaching, counseling, and other supports in each of our buildings. As communication and collaboration increases with district-wide curriculum tools and supports, each child will benefit and truly receive a “special” education each day they come to school.

AlertNow Notification System

Keeping parents and employees informed is a top priority of Fremont City Schools. That is why we will be implementing the AlertNow notification system this year.

This notification system is an online service and will allow district personnel to contact parents for reasons, such as, school cancellations (snow days), rescheduled athletic events, 2hr. delays, student attendance. Phone calls, messages, email and text messages would be used to contact parents.

This service will allow us to provide important information about school events and/or emergencies provided the school district has your current contact information. To ensure that the school district has the current contact information, Fremont City Schools will perform a “test message” telephone call to all parents and employees on September 3, 2008 at approximately 7:00pm. More information about this new system will be provided in a letter home and/or future news articles.

Jarod's Law

In 2006, the Ohio General Assembly passed Substitute House Bill 203, also known as Jarod's Law. This bill requires sanitarians from local health departments to conduct annual inspections of the school buildings and associated grounds contained within their jurisdictions to identify health and safety concerns. As part of this legislation, Ohio Administrative Code chapter 3701-54 was created. This chapter includes the regulations that school buildings must comply with, and that local health departments must enforce during their inspections.

The areas that are inspected are:

Grounds and Building Exterior – playgrounds, solid waste disposal areas, and outdoor athletic facilities.

School Indoor Environments – hallways and stairwells.

Specialty Classroom Areas – science, visual arts, and industrial arts classrooms, stages, and music and family/consumer science classrooms.

Administrative and Non-Classroom Areas – auditoriums and student dining, library/media centers, indoor athletic facilities, locker rooms, training or weight-lifting rooms, restrooms, custodial closets, mechanical rooms, attics/mezzanines/crawls, water/wastewater systems, and health care areas.

After the inspections are complete, reports are provided to the schools identifying corrective action to be taken. Some examples you may see when you visit our buildings are: cafeteria tables in all elementary buildings have an additional safety latch at the top of each table to help prevent tipping while in a stored, upright position, and all buildings will have “No Idling Zone” signs posted outside to help reduce emissions. Behind-the-scenes health and safety actions being completed are things like chemicals must be stored in special cabinets, and building roofs must be annually inspected.

This law has required many additional costs to the district and general fund dollars will be used so that the district is in compliance with the law. Fremont City Schools is committed to the safety of your children and we will strive to continue to make our facilities safe for optimal learning experiences.
