Staff Diversity Training

All new Fremont City School teachers have participated in monthly meetings to acclimate themselves to FCS. Participants have been provided information on the operating systems, procedures, population, and practices of Fremont City Schools. The most recent New Teacher Meeting included information about the diversity within the school system. Bonnie Weaver and Kim Beardmore, members of the Curriculum Department, led the staff in discussion of how our school community and student population are diverse. Using data from our 2010-11 Report Card, participants compared gender, ethnicity, economic status and academic achievement of the student population. Once the facts were shared, teachers were able to make connections to the students in their building and how this aggregate data correlated between students and staff. By building a greater awareness with our teachers about individual students sitting in the seats in classrooms, we are determined to establish relationships and close the achievement gap within our student population. After the meeting, one staff member shared, "I learned how diverse our district really is. It made me realize how different our students' experiences really could be."

Hayes Students Believe in Giving Back

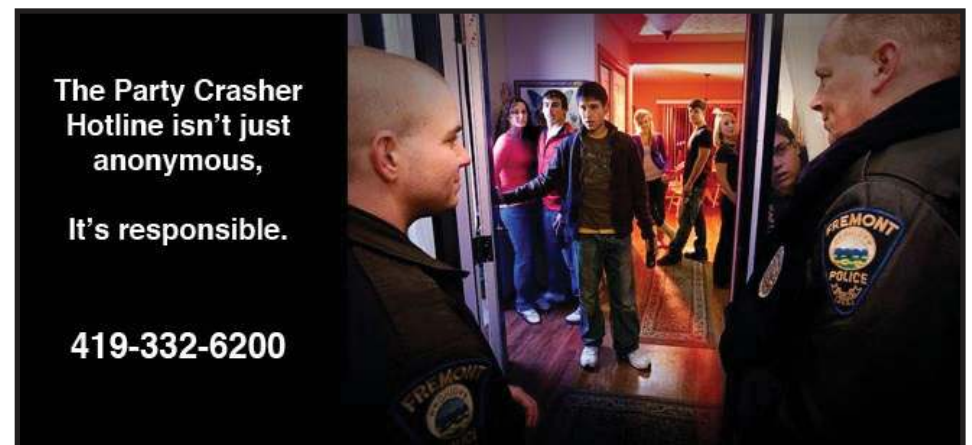
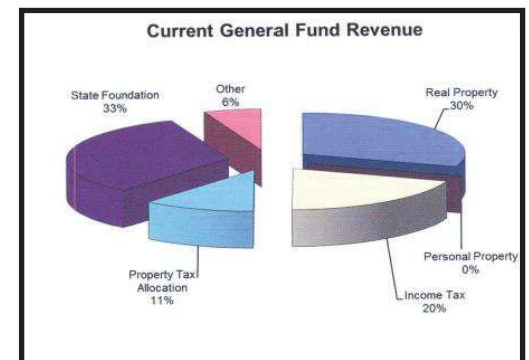

Safety is a Top Priority

The Fremont Board of Education is committed to providing a safe learning and work environment. Unfortunately, natural and man-made disasters do occur. Emergencies are best met by preparedness and planning.

Board of Education Policy states that all threats to the safety of district students and facilities shall be identified by appropriate personnel and responded to promptly in accordance with the district's emergency preparedness plan.

Fire, tornado and school lockdown drills are conducted in accordance with State law. Fire drills are conducted nine (9) times a year. School lockdown drills are conducted on a monthly basis. During a school lockdown drill, students are instructed in the appropriate procedures to follow in situations where students must be secured in their building (rather than evacuated). Local law enforcement agencies work in collaboration with the district schools periodically when conducting these drills.

All Fremont City School employees have also been trained in a secondary lockdown procedure known as ALICE. ALICE stands for Alert-Lockdown-Inform-Counter-Evacuate.

The safety of each and every one of the students and staff attending Fremont City Schools is a top priority each and every day. It is the goal of the Fremont City Schools to keep all students in school every day focused on academics, but if and when emergencies occur, each building staff member will be ready to protect all students. We appreciate the cooperation of all parents and guardians in understanding the need for drill practice and reinforcing the district safety procedures.

Old FMS Site on Croghan Street

Abdo Wrecking, LLC has completed their work for the season. All concrete work is complete and topsoil and dormant seed have been placed.

Any low areas found to be holding water will be filled with topsoil in the spring and some areas may require re-seeding. Asphalt at the Park Avenue curb will be replaced in the spring once asphalt plants are again open for the season.

The district plans to create a memorial of the old building and the British soldiers for that site in the near future.
