Men With Manners




A new club has started at Otis Elementary and Atkinson Elementary this winter called The M & M Club (Men with Manners). At Otis, this club is led by Mr. Schwartz, Wellness teacher, and Mr. Melter, 4th grade teacher. It is a club designed to help teach manners to fourth and fifth grade young men. The club meets monthly, and students are required to dress more formally on club meeting days. This includes wearing dress shirts and ties, nice pants, and nice shoes.

During the first meeting, the young men learned how to tie a tie. One student was so excited about tying ties that he went home that evening and practiced until he had it mastered. He came to school the next day very excited to show Mr. Melter that he knew how to do it. They will keep practicing tying ties as the spring continues. The club also discusses how to treat and address adults respectfully, especially women and elders. There was also a discussion about resolving conflicts in a more respectful manner.

Future meetings will cover things such as handshakes, eye contact, holding doors for others, allowing others to sit down first, restaurant etiquette, and the importance of respecting and helping those who may need assistance (especially the elderly or disabled people). Some of the ideas that we will be teaching might be thought of as common sense to older generations. Unfortunately, many students do not know about many of these or practice them regularly. It is our goal that we will help these young men become Men with Manners.

Stamm Elementary Students Learn Using Technology

Stamm Elementary educators are challenging students to effectively utilize technology as a learning tool throughout the grade levels. Introducing technology at young ages prepares students to explore and become familiar with the use of technological equipment. Elementary education is the time to develop valuable habits and encourage creativity, while still offering a high level of guidance. The skills students are developing now will prepare them to successfully enter the future workforce. Using technology in safe and enriching ways allows students to develop research and problem-solving skills, communication skills, and an awareness of digital citizenship. Starting in kindergarten, students begin learning to navigate on a screen using a touchpad or mouse, opening and closing programs, and printing documents. As the students progress and develop confidence, foundational skills are introduced such as creating slides, documents, and presentations. They learn to toggle between programs and screens, and answer questions, even submitting their work to their teachers online. Students can even collaborate on assignments such as projects and research online. Second graders are using technology to publish their writing, researching topics like animals and biographical information, creating maps, participating in virtual science experiments and field trips, and submitting their work online for evaluation. All this exposure to technology prepares our students for the online assessments required at higher elementary levels.

In focus lessons, strategies and skills are aligned with what is being taught in the classroom. Students working in focus groups learn with different activities but on the same topic as their peers. This allows students to reinforce what they have learned or learn the concepts in a different way. Mrs. Willey often pairs the lesson with a hands-on activity that reinforces the reason why the students are learning what they are learning, and helps prepare students for the next steps in the learning process.

Teachers Weigh in on “Why we need new schools?”


