Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA)

Thank you to everyone who participated in the District's ESSA meetings and/or completed the on-line survey. Please see the resolution approved by the Board of Education on March 6, 2017. This resolution was sent to our State Superintendent, State Board of Education, Senator Burke and Representative Reineke. The information was also shared with Representative Reineke during his visit to Fremont City Schools on March 20th.

WHEREAS, the federal Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) was signed into law on December 10, 2015, to give states and local school districts the flexibility to incorporate new measures of quality and success into their educational accountability systems; and

WHEREAS, on February 12, 2017, the Ohio Department of Education (ODE) released a draft overview of its plan for complying with the provisions of ESSA; and

WHEREAS, the Fremont City School District hosted nine (9) community meetings to give citizens an opportunity to review Ohio's draft plan and allow participants to share their thoughts about the plan. In addition, nine (9) building principals held building-level meetings to share Ohio's draft plan with educators; and

WHEREAS, approximately 80 community members participated in the community meetings and approximately 300 educators attended building-level meetings; and

WHEREAS, the feedback from these meetings includes the following:

- Reduce the number of state assessments and only test what is mandated by the federal law;
- Provide more detailed student data on Ohio's state assessments and provide that information in a timely manner so data can be used for instructional and curricular purposes;
- Develop an accountability system that is more balanced and does not put an emphasis on standardized test scores;
- Create a more descriptive rating system that appropriately defines the achievement and progress of students.
- Allow school districts to develop local indicators of excellence that reflect the quality of their schools and include as a rating on the report card;
- Revise the current graduation system so it is not based so heavily on standardized test scores;
- Eliminate the retention component of the Third Grade Reading Guarantee; and
- Address students with disabilities within the ESSA plan. Students identified with disabilities who cannot perform at the same level as their peers should not be expected to pass grade level state testing even with accommodations. Their testing should be aligned to their Individualized Education Plans.

NOW, THEREFORE on behalf of the citizens of our community, we are asking our state education policymakers to consider our request to include the aforementioned changes in ODE's plan for complying with ESSA and to give Ohio citizens a stronger voice with the development of statewide education policies.



Leadership at Croghan Elementary

Croghan 5th graders are 21st century learners. Not only do they practice their keyboarding, document formatting, and Internet searching skills, but they also push their higher level thinking abilities to the max. In Math, some students write scripts then record podcasts explaining how to multiply fractions, add and subtract decimals, and perform long division. In English Language Arts, students evaluate web sites to determine if they are reliable sources and write essays that synthesize information from multiple sources. They enter their individualized word lists into Spelling City where they also track their progress, and even chat about the Question of the Day in their Google Classroom. In Social Studies, students construct wikis - web sites that allow users to create and edit content together – to help themselves understand the elements of civilization. Students also complete Internet research to create planet presentations in Science class, with some students using an online presentation platform, Prezi. Through all of this, Croghan fifth graders collaborate and communicate, helping each other troubleshoot the inevitable lag in the bandwidth and the crashing web sites, as they move toward their futures at FMS and closer to their prospective careers.



Atkinson Elementary Fourth Grade Students Tackling Challenging Study Projects

The fourth grade students at Atkinson have been working on completing projects in both Social Studies and Reading, and the end results have been both exciting and beneficial for all! In Social Studies, we completed our American Revolution unit by assembling a History Pocket Book. The pages helped students in learning about the Boston Tea Party and Boston Massacre along with other causes of the American Revolution. Once we began studying the Revolution, we included pages about the battles, uniforms of the British soldiers and colonists, and the Midnight Ride of Paul Revere. Along with the booklet, students read comic books and listened to modern day

rap songs, which they insisted on hearing again and again. Our latest reading project consisted of a Flip Book that was completed after reading a chapter book of their choice. The flaps were labeled with the story elements, summary, and illustrations of their favorite part of the book. These book reports were presented in front of their peers so that others would be interested in reading the book.
