Five individuals, 1974 football team to join Ross Hall

FREMONT - Shane Moran, Jacque Fate Dauch, Eleanor Tennerstedt, Rex Radeloff, Ron Brant and the football team from 1974 will be inducted in the Fremont Ross Hall of Fame next month.

Most Valuable Player Larry Liggins helped Fremont Ross win the Buckeye Conference for the third straight year in 1974.

The Little Giants were unbeaten for the first time in 17 seasons. They tied Lorain Admiral King 0-0.

Defensive lineman Dan Kreilick stood out on a defense that allowed a program-record 33 points, including seven shutouts. Ross finished eighth in the Associated Press and UP polls and second in computer points for the region.

Offensive lineman Harold Ramirez keyed the offense and Tom Hollman was the coach.

Tennerstedt taught physical education and coached swimming from 1928-1940. She helped institute the GAA program at Ross in 1940 after girls athletics were eliminated because of the Great Depression.

It continued until girls varsity sports were reintroduced in the 1970s.

Tennerstedt coached the Fremont Huskies girls basketball team to three undefeated seasons.

Dauch qualified to state in 11 events and finished third in the 50 freestyle twice. She was 59th in the nation in the 50 and as part of a 200 freestyle relay to earn All-American status.

Dauch finished in the top eight on two other occasions at state. She continued her career at Toledo and helped establish a program record in the 200 freestyle relay.

Moran earned three letters for football, three for baseball and two for basketball. He was a tri-captain with Charles Woodson as Ross's football team won the Great Lakes League in 1994.

The Little Giants were 9-1 in 1993.

Radeloff earned the second-most wins in program history as Ross's football coach. He finished 71-41.

The Little Giants won the Buckeye Central Conference in 1989 and 1990 and the Great Lakes League in 1994 and 1995. Ross qualified to the postseason in 1989 and 1994.

Brant coached cross country at Ross for 15 years starting in 1967. He took the helm of the track team in 1969 after serving as an assistant for eight years.

Nine Little Giants qualified to state over the next 10 years.
