FREMONT - Sandusky County Positive People held its 8th Annual High School Positive Living Award Breakfast on Wednesday at the Neeley Center on the campus of Terra State Community College.

The SCPP High School Positive Living Award Scholarships have been presented annually since 2012 to area high school students who have faced extreme adversity and have come out on the other side with a positive attitude.

This year SCPP recognized 12 local high school seniors for the courage it took to face and overcome their challenges with integrity, self-reliance, determination and

perseverance. A total of \$33,450 was awarded at this year's breakfast, bringing the grand total awarded by SCPP to over \$143,500 to 68 students.

First Place: Sabrina Wooten (Bishop Hoffman Catholic School), \$5,000.

Second Place: Trinity Morelock (Lakota Local Schools), \$4,500.

Third Place: Kayden Gilbert (Clyde-Green Springs Schools), \$3,500 and Maryn Klaus (Lakota Local Schools), \$3,500.

Fourth Place: Lexi Sours (Fremont City Schools), \$3,000.

Finalists: Erin and Erica Hartley (Lakota Local Schools) with Erin receiving \$1,500 and Erica receiving \$3,000; Reis Ulman (Clyde- Green Springs Schools), \$2,500; Kayla Rich (Fremont City Schools), \$1,500; Kirsten Talley (Bellevue City Schools District), \$1,500; Raleigh Weaver (Fremont City Schools), \$1,500; and Kade Kardotzke (Clyde-Green Springs Schools) \$2,000.

Positive Impact Awards went to Jennifer Foster, Tyler Myers, Stephanie Brower and Nancy Brown for positively impacting the students' lives.

Two Spark Awards were given to students Kayden Gilbert and Reis Ulman.

A Courage Award was given to Sabrina Wooten.

Michaels, Breymaier share tales at The Barn

ELMORE - A capacity crowd of members and friends gathered at The Barn in Elmore for the recent Spring Meeting of the Ottawa County Historical Society.

After a lunch buffet, area historians Larry Michaels, and Peter Navarre descendant Terry Breymaier shared tales from "The Life and Times of Peter Navarre".

Michaels told lively stories of the War of 1812 courier and scout who delivered the famous message from Oliver Hazard Perry to General William Henry Harrison: "We have met the enemy and they are ours."

Michaels gave a unique telling of the seminal battles and turning points of the War: Peter Navarre witnessed the siege of Fort Meigs, the defense of Fort Stephenson, the massacre at the River Raisin, the Battle of the Thames, and the Battle of Lake Erie.

He reminded his audience that the states of Ohio, Michigan, and Wisconsin would not have existed without American victories in these battles, which proved to be the turning point of the final territorial confrontation between the British and the Americans.

Breymaier has served as the President of the East Toledo Historical Society and is the author and co-author of many local history books, including "Peter Navarre, War of 1812 Scout." Breymaier has taken part in many costumed re-enactments, and he and his extended family have been instrumental in preserving the family's history.
