PCHS Robo-Skins compete at BGSU

BOWLING GREEN - The Robo-Skins did a great job representing Port Clinton High School on Sunday at the 6th annual Falcon BEST Robotics competition held in Bowling Green State University's Stroh Center.

Their robot performed better than expected against 12 other teams. The young team of first-year fabricators was composed of freshmen William Zimmerman and Richard McLaughlin, sophomores Tommy and Willy Brooks, and led by senior Leo Winterich. Bobby Good, adviser, stated, "We were in third and fourth place during the initial seeding rounds and qualified for the



semi-finals. We tried our best in the semis but didn't qualify for the finals.”

This year’s display and exhibit interview, led by senior Madyson Webb, featured a video game programmed by junior Chase Barton, a 3-D computer aided design (CAD) solid model by senior Ally Batterton and the team beach clean-up held in October at City Beach. The interview ranked second and was 0.3 of 25 points behind first place.

The pep band organized by junior Dylan Smothers helped to energize the crowd throughout the game. The marketing presentation led by sophomore Ben Lucas gave a sales pitch to a panel of judges in a "Shark Tank"-like interview.

Good added, “After graduating large numbers of seniors the past two years this year's team was smaller than in the past. Over half the students on this year’s team were first-year members. Returning and new members this year were able to develop skills they need to succeed in future competitions and in future careers in STEM.”
