The brick veneer is going onto the four new elementary schools and the final touches on the roofs are being completed. Interior painting is beginning and the HVAC systems are being installed. We are within our budget and on track to move in this fall. We will be releasing the boundaries for the new buildings very soon.

We are making progress on the new Ross High School and will see the building walls come out of the ground soon. The bids for the high school came in under budget. The move in to the new high school will most likely be over Christmas Break 2021. The Gilbane/Mosser team has kept us moving forward and we have been able to include many local contractors in our project. Due to the generosity of our community, the future of our district is bright indeed.

We have expanded the course offerings at Ross High School to include courses from BGSU that are taught by our teachers. This helps keep those kids in our buildings and helps families save on future costs.

that help them learn and grow. Other students hold after-school jobs that teach them the values of time and money management as well as hard work. Students are finding their niche and striving to make things better every day.

Students are learning the value of community service and understanding what

it means to give back to the community. They are seeking out ways to give back. Whether it be a new recycling project at Ross, a project to give back

to our Veterans, helping those less fortunate, working at the Village House, Share & Care, the Humane Society and/or the Soup Kitchen, or even mentoring or peer tutoring other students, students are giving back to the community. Ross students are working hard in and out of the classroom. They are engaged and involved and are successful examples of what it means to be a Little Giant!



### And the Winner Is...

Teachers reward their students in a variety of ways. Some give out high fives or fist bumps. Some teach their students the "silent cheer". Some hand out peppermints or other types of treats. These incentives, of course, are all used by teachers as a way to motivate students to want to give the correct answer and/or make the right choice.

At Washington Elementary, in room 7, you will find that each student has a baggie filled with 50/50 tickets in his or her desk. No, this teacher isn't selling tickets to her students and keeping half for herself. Instead, she is using these tickets as a form of reward. During class when a question is asked, a name is randomly drawn. If the student answers correctly, a ticket is rewarded. Tickets can also be rewarded for receiving the highest score on a test, for being a good friend to someone in need, for coming to class with all the necessary materials, and maybe even for having no in-

complete or late homework assignments for the week.

After four weeks of rewarding tickets, a prize drawing takes place. Ten tickets are drawn at random. Each winning ticket earns a prize. The prizes include homework passes, chapter books, crafts, school/art supplies, lunch with a buddy, and special chair. You can hear a pin drop as the students anxiously wait to hear the next seven digit number. And the winner is...

### **Mission Accomplished!**

In fourth grade math, it is necessary to have the basic multiplication times tables memorized in order to succeed. Our District has implemented a reward incentive to motivate our fourth graders to memorize their multiplication facts. This program is called Mission Multiplication, and when a student memorizes their facts they receive a special math medal on a purple and white ribbon! In Mrs. McBride's fourth grade math class at Atkinson, the students take a three minute multiplication timed test once a week. The timed test consists of 50 mixed multiplication problems from the zero

through ten times tables. When a student gets all 50 problems correct (for the first time) in the three minutes, they earn their medal and a special certificate from Mrs. McBride! Mrs. McBride begins this program at the start of the second nine weeks, and her students have until the end of the school year to earn their medal. So far, more than half of her students have already passed their timed test. Once students have mastered their multiplication facts in her class, she starts challenging them with division timed tests as well as addition, sub-traction, multiplication, and division mixed tests.

### Past Life

The fourth graders at Lutz Elementary have had some wonderful extension activities to begin their year in Social Studies. In October, they all had the opportunity to travel to Sauder's Museum in Archbold, Ohio. They were able to experience the way the early settlers made a living in Northwest Ohio. In the fall, the students also had Mrs. Nofzinger make a visit to their classroom. She was able to describe the Great Black Swamp in great detail and explain how the Native Americans lived before the settlers arrived.

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## **Building a Bright Future!**

There is a lot of excitement and anticipation surrounding the opening of the four new elementary buildings next school year. With this comes a flurry of questions about what may or may not be happening in the District. We will try to address your questions as we are made aware of them. The first being whether Fremont City Schools will continue to accept open enrollment from other districts and between the elementary buildings. The answer is yes, we will continue to accept open enrollment students from other districts. We will also continue to accept intra-district open enrollment.

The open enrollment period for both will continue to be March 1st thru March 31st. The guidelines and applications can be found on the Fremont City Schools website <u>fremontschools.net</u> under the Student Registration tab.

Mrs. Bliss also expressed how important it is for a student to follow their dreams and not be afraid to make the sacrifices needed to be successful.






In early 2000, it became evident that the community of Fremont was not able to operate independently with respect to athletic facilities shared by our local public and parochial schools. As such, The Fremont Area Athletic Foundation was formed, currently named, "The Fremont Area Foundation". This Foundation was formed in order to pool resources in order to focus all efforts in repairing and rebuilding the area facilities with private, state , and/or local dollars.

Under the leadership of the foundation, a 501c3 corporation, many subcommittees have advanced on a broad front. Collectively, the completed projects include:

- New tennis courts behind Ross High School
- A new baseball/softball complex, Alumni Fields, for Ross High School
- Baseball fields for SJCC
- A new stadium, named Don Paul Stadium at Harmon Field, which includes field turf, bleachers, locker rooms, team meeting areas, and restrooms (shared by Ross and SJCC)
- A new wrestling facility at Ross High School
- A new natatorium at Ross High School (shared by Ross and SJCC)
- Seven new classrooms for Ross High School



While we continue to raise funds privately, we are always exploring new ways to reach our alumni base and expand our reach to prospective donors.
