Fremont City Schools Welcomes – Dr. Traci McCaudy, Superintendent of Schools

elcome to the first edition of The Fremont Focus. a Fremont City School District newsletter. The purpose of this monthly newsletter is to inform our FCS parents and students in grades K-12 about some of the positive events and initiatives that are happening throughout the district! This newsletter was

created by Mrs. Heidi Gallagher, Ross H.S. teacher, along with her journalism class. All costs associated with the development and distribution of this newsletter have been paid by this month's sponsor – *Memorial Hospital of Fremont*. Despite making improvements, the Fremont City School 2005-06 Local Report Card reported that the district is in its fifth year of Continuous Improvement and the district did not meet Adequate Yearly Progress

(AYP). The components that determine whether a district meets AYP are:

- Reading (both test scores and the participation rate are counted);
- Mathematics (both test scores and the participation rate are counted);
- Attendance Rate; andGraduation Rate.

All student groups (All Students, African American Students, Hispanic Students, Multiracial Students, White Students, Students with Disabilities, Students with Limited English Proficiency, and Economically Disadvantaged Students) must meet their goals for a district to meet AYP. Because the district did not meet AYP in math and reading for the 2005-06 school year, the Fremont City School District is in Year One of District Improvement.

After careful analysis of the local report card data, the district developed the following three district goals:

- Increase student achievement.
- Close the socio-economic, ethnic, and disability gaps in student achievement.

• Build hope, trust and respect within our community.

Additionally, the district has developed a two-year improvement plan. This plan will intensely focus on student achievement by providing a clear strategy of action for the

design and delivery of curriculum. We are confident that the outcome of the plan will be improvement on the state report card.

The district's two-year improvement plan and the 2006-07 Comprehensive Continuous Improvement Plan are located on the district's website, fremontschools.net. We plan to provide you with quarterly status reports regarding our progress toward meeting our goals.

Lastly, the district is asking for your support of the emergency levy on November 7th. This operating levy that will generate much-needed funds (\$3.6 million in annual funds for five years) that will be used for basics such as purchasing textbooks and other supplementary materials; developing curriculum guides and assessment tools; providing student intervention programs; operating the day-to-day functions of the district; maintaining and funding current extracurricular activities; maintaining desired class sizes; and maintaining adequate numbers of teachers.

Though the district has maintained a tight budget and has implemented many cost saving measures throughout the years, Fremont City Schools still projects a negative balance in its 2007 fiscal year budget due to increased fixed costs, mandated (but unfunded) state programs, loss of business revenue, loss of personal property tax, and state basic aid cuts of \$57 per student. The State of Ohio has placed Fremont City Schools in the category of "Fiscal Caution" and failure of the levy will move FCS closer to "receivership" by the State of Ohio, which will mean that FCS will lose much of its local control of our schools.

Families within this program need to comply with the four parts of the program: 1.) Early Childhood Education, 2.) Adult Education, 3.) Parenting Education, and 4.) PACT (Parent And Child Together time). Each family also has two home visits monthly.

Ross Water Tests

S tudents in Mr. Havice's Environmental Biology classes and Mr. Bates' AP Biology class are participating in a Sandusky River Watershed Environmental Study. Fremont City Schools, along with several other area school districts, is participating in this nearly \$20,000 grant provided by the Martha Holden Jennnings foundation. Partner agencies include the Northern Ohio Educational Computer Association (NOECA), Sandusky

River Watershed Coalition, and Ohio Department of Natural Resources the Division of Natural Areas and Preserves Ohio Scenic Rivers Program (Sandusky Scenic River). Heidelburg College Water Quality Laboratory scientists and researchers will contribute their expertise in the field of water quality.

Each team will conduct their research at selected sampling sites within the Sandusky River watershed (Fremont's location is at the

> Tindall Bridge) and record their findings on the interactive, dynamic SRWE Study website.

Busy Bucci
