Information from the report was taken to develop oral speeches. Each student was required to find a costume, bring a prop, and memo-

rize their oral speech about their famous person. On the big day, all of the 5th graders were assigned a location in the gym. Visitors entered the "museum" and had to push the button on the table in front of each student to hear the oral speeches in true Wax Museum style. The knowledge that was shared by these fifth graders about famous African Americans was phenomenal!

Swimming in individual events; in the 50 free, Jacque Fate placed 2nd in prelims and 3rd in the championship finals with a time of 23.74, placing 11th in the 100 free prelims. Jessica Ickes placed 14th in consolation finals with a time of 53.47, and Taylor Waggoner placed 13th in both prelims and consolation finals in the 100 fly with a final time of 58.72. In the men's 50 free Lincoln Fahrbach placed 1st in prelims and 2nd in championship finals with a time of 20.82, he also placed 1st in the 100 free prelims and placed 3rd in finals with a time of 45.88. All four individual swimmers had astonishing swims, podium or not. Having the opportunity to go to state swims, podium or not. Having the opportunity to go to state

is a great accomplishment. Placing 4th in both prelims and championship finals, Fremont's Lady Giants were dominate in the 200 free relay with a time of 1:37.88. Ickes, Waggoner, Courtney Gabel, and Fate all had splits under 26 seconds. Moving up three spots from prelims to consolation finals in the 400 free relay, the girls' placed 13th with a time of 3:40.25. Also swimming at state were: Christy Meggitt, Jordan

Beck, Dexter Foos, Gerritt Knutzen, Kyle Wasserman and Erick White. For some swimmers this was their fourth and final year to swim at state and to others it was their first: however, Fremont Ross is not only proud of these thirteen individuals for their accomplishments in the pool, but as pointed out by Mr. Art Bucci, athletic director, this team holds the highest team GPA at Ross. The boys' team average is 3.2, and the girls' average is 3.3. In or out of the pool, they are fabulous.

Hello, my name is David Chambers. I was selected by the members of the Fremont Board of Education to be the treasurer of the school district starting January. I have been a treasurer in the State of Ohio for over four years and an assistant treasurer four years prior. I have worked in large school districts with 12,000 students and small districts with 1,600 students. Prior to my working with schools, I worked for the Cuyahoga County Auditors Office.

As treasurer, I am responsible to the Board for all matters in the district relating to finances. In the business world, this is known as the Chief Financial Officer. To be effective, I must be able to communicate. Communication with board members, administrators, support staff and teachers leads to a transparent operation of the treasurer's office. This communication provides input that makes the treasurer's office function more efficiently and effectively for the school district.

Because I believe communication is essential to the successful management of the district finances, I stated to the members of the Board of Education upon one interview that I maintain an open door policy, in which anyone can walk in and communicate their concerns. As treasurer, I have never closed my door.
