This school year has been a busy one to say the least! So far we have traveled to "Letter People Land" and have met our friends Mr. Mm with a "Munchie Mouth," Mr. Tt with "Tall Teeth," Mr. Ff with "Funny Feet," Mr. Hh with "Horrible Hair," Mr. Nn with a "Noisy Nose," Mr. Bb with "Beautiful Buttons," Miss. Aa with the "Aaaaacho," Mr. Zz with "Zipping Zippers," and Mr. Pp with "Pointy Patches."

We have begun reading, with half of the students being ready to take part in the school "<u>At Home Reading</u> <u>Program</u>," and begin working on high frequency word lists!

The children have also begun to use visualization and their schema to make personal connections while reading or being read to! They put their visualization skills to the test when they became illustrators for the story "Five Little Turkeys Sitting on a Fence."



In Math, we have been counting to 100 and working on coin recognition, telling time to the hour and patterning. I am so thrilled with how well the children are catching on to all these skills and how quickly they are mastering them!

Most recently, we spent a lot of time learning about the First Thanksgiving and the Pilgrims and Indians. When first asked about what they knew about Thanksgiving the children responded that they eat turkey and see their grandmas and grandpas. NOW... they are able to share why the Pilgrims left England, how they traveled to America, what they traveled on, how long their journey took and why they were so thankful to the Native Americans. It has been exciting to watch them as they learn this new information! They are very proud of themselves!

I feel extremely proud of all that the children have accomplished in such a short amount of time and look forward to leading them further down their educational path!

Program Prepares Children



The Sandusky County Department of Job and Family Services and the Fremont City Schools, in partnership with WSOS Community Action Commission, are providing Stamm's School Readiness program which serves 20 students throughout their Kindergarten year. The purpose of the program is to provide intervention and additional learning opportunities for students in need. Research shows that intervention at an early age yields the best results!

The program will enthusiastically run from November until May and is staffed by Mrs. Kayden, the kindergarten teacher, and Mrs. Kramer, the instructional classroom aide. The students attend their regular kindergarten class in the morning and the Readiness program in the afternoon. This all-day schedule includes lunch, recess, and appropriate transportation.

The extended day Kindergarten program at Stamm

is center-based. Children learn best by doing, through active engagement activities that have purpose but are fun. This is crucial to both cognitive and social development. Center time is an important part of the students' day. They address the following skills: communication, phonemic awareness, word recognition, vocabulary and concept development. Self help skills, including getting along with others, building relationships with peers and teachers, bathroom etiquette and leaning social manners and rules are being taught in this beneficial program at Stamm.

Parental participation is very important to the success of this program. The Stamm parents want to be involved in their child's academic development. Opportunities are provided for parents volunteering in the classroom, going on fieldtrips with the class, and participating in periodic conferences with Mrs. Kayden and Mrs. Kramer. We are very excited about this wonderful opportunity for our kindergarten students at Stamm!

Spraying the principal with silly string? Duct taping the behavior intervention aide to the wall? These are just some of the lengths the Atkinson staff has been using to reward students that consistently follow the recess rules.

Each month a new reward assembly is planned. Every student has the opportunity to be included in these fun assemblies if...he/she has not earned any playground rule infractions during the entire month. On the average month, about 325 of the school's 340 students are able to attend the reward assembly based on their good, positive choices outside.

The assemblies are short, lasting about 15 minutes. Mrs. Smith, the principal, always begins by congratulating all of the students in the audience and asking them to join her in a huge roaring round of applause for working so hard making good choices during the month.

Then, the fun begins...loud music is played, students sing and laugh, and the brave staff member of the month is subject to the promised silly stunt.

During each assembly, pictures are taken and a poster is made to be displayed in the hallway to encourage other students to work hard so they can attend next month's assembly. Last year, male staff members dressed in hula skirts and led a conga line, the principal got dressed as a turkey and danced through the gym, and Mr. Logsdon took cream pies in the face.

This is the second year of the assembly reward program. Mrs. Smith and other staff report a decrease in playground discipline issues since the incentive program has gone into effect. Students report that the assemblies make students feel good and have a fun time each month. A huge majority of the students at Atkinson are now consistently modeling and demonstrating positive behavior choices outside by respecting themselves, respecting others, and respecting property. From the desk of Dr. McCaudy

Dear Fremont Community:

As you may be aware, the FCS Board of Education recently approved a resolution to place a five-year RENEWAL Income Tax (1.25%) Levy on the ballot for March 4, 2008. This RENEWAL Levy WILL NOT COST taxpayers any additional monies. By approving this renewal, the district will continue to receive \$6.6 million per year for the next five years. Again, passage of this levy WILL NOT INCREASE TAXES FOR ANY CITIZEN OF FREMONT.

Because of the levy failures last school year, the district had to make difficult cuts and reductions in services and personnel. Despite these levy failures, the administration, teachers and support staff remain focused on providing a good, high-quality education that will prepare students for life after high school. This professional attitude has helped the district achieve its first-ever "Effective" rating on the Ohio Department of Education Report Card. We are very confident that we will continue to improve our academic performance each year, and we will reach our goal of becoming an "Excellent" school district in the near future.

In order to achieve this goal, the district must, at the very least, maintain its current educational programming and services. If the RENEWAL Levy does not pass in March the district will face a shortfall of \$6.6 million dollars from its annual budget begin-



ning next year and will have to make additional and drastic reductions to its entire package of services to students.
