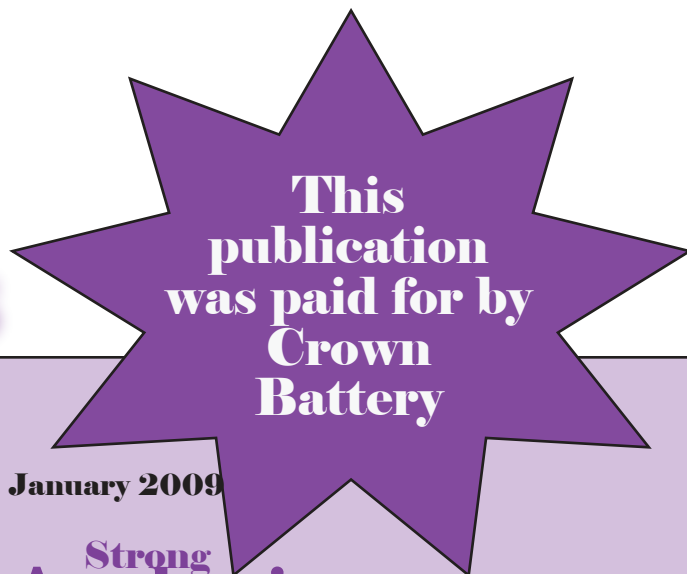

Learning meets State Standards at F.M.S.

Mrs. Grear's 8th grade Language Arts Classes have just completed a short story unit and author study. Flashback, foreshadowing, plot, theme, setting, parallel episodes, and inference are just a few of the many academic standards found in the State of Ohio Academic Content Standards book that have been covered so far this year. These areas will be continually used again and again with additional standards added each month.

Currently, we are beginning the research portion of the Academic Content Standards. Students have been in the Library researching aquatic animals and will be incorporating all aspects of research (note taking, outlining, preparing a formal paper, bibliography/works cited pages, etc.) with this project. They will also be using their Communications Standards to present their projects.

Additionally, the classes continue each week to work on Acquisition of Vocabulary Academic Content Standards with the presence of the "ever popular" Vocabulary Packets. Our goal is to increase the student's use of academic vocabulary in all areas of instruction.

Mrs. Miller's 8th grade Language Arts – In Mrs. Miller's Language Arts class, we are focusing on writing process skills. Using memoirs as models, the students are going to write a personal narrative. We began by brainstorming memories of our past and by developing our writing skills through mini-lessons. Students will then learn and utilize research skills to find information about a person and present what they learn through one of the following: posters, essays, or power point.



Caring Builds Character at Hayes



This year at Hayes Elementary, we are focusing on a different character word each month. In December, the word was CARING. Mrs. Marcha's and Mrs. Taylor's fourth grade classes discussed what it means to be caring and decided it means being nice, helping others, respecting other people's things and feelings, and helping the environment. The students also read articles in the newspaper and found a lot of examples of people in our community doing caring things. We then asked the students to write a plan of action that would demonstrate their

ability to be caring. Here are some of their ideas:

Austin Overmyer is a junior at Fremont Ross and is currently serving as the Vice President of the Fremont FFA. Austin was life-flighted to St. Vincent's on December 31 with third degree burns covering most of his face and hands. Austin was burned tragically while helping his father in the family farm shop. Austin will undergo multiple surgeries to repair his injuries. The community support for Austin has been overwhelming. The Fremont FFA chapter will be

hosting a benefit dinner this spring at the county fair grounds for Austin after he is home. “The plan is to include as many FFA chapters as possible. Clyde FFA, Gibsonburg FFA and Lakota FFA have all agreed to help,” stated Mr. Dave Rapp, Austin's Agriculture Instructor and FFA Advisor. “This will be a great opportunity for students to learn about planning, organizing and citizenship, as well as compassion.”

With the help of Schiets Motorsports and the Fremont Young Farmers, which is the Fremont FFA Adult Education Group, a \$10 donation raffle has been established for Austin. The raffle will be for a new 4-wheeler. FFA members from area FFA chapters have volunteered to help with the donation raffle. The group will have Austin pull the winning ticket at his benefit dinner organized by area FFA members this spring after Austin has recovered. Mr. Rapp concluded, “Austin Overmyer is a very respectful and motivated leader of our FFA Chapter. He deserves all of the support our school and community can give.”

Ms. Randolph's second grade class at Atkinson School (Loves to Sign). Three days a week Mrs. Mees the sign language interpreter provides "sign time" to the second grade class so that the children can communicate better with their hearing impaired peers.

On December 1st the second grade students demonstrated their newly learned skills to friends and family during a school performance called "Sign Night". Mrs. Stradtman, a Bowling Green instructor

and a supervisor for the sign interpreters at the North Central Ohio Education Service Center invited her students from Bowling Green to join Ms. Randolph's class during this activity. The students in Ms. Randolph's class signed four songs to an intrigued audience. After the performance small reading circles were formed which included 2 Bowling Green students and five or six second grader. While they were in their reading circles the college students read and signed stories to the second graders. They watched and listened with awe. Friends and family were encouraged to join the reading circles along with the children.

The night was very exciting and it was a great way to begin to bridge together the deaf and hearing communities.

Fremont Middle School Project Update

The list below includes a brief summary of the work completed by the district this past month regarding the middle school project.

- The district negotiated a service contract with its design firm, Fanning Howey.
 - The Program of Requirements Committee continues to meet on a regular basis for the purpose of determining the number and size of classrooms, office space, gymnasium and other educational space.
 - A Design Team Committee consisting of school personnel, parents, students and community members has been developed and will begin meeting this month. Additional sub-committees will be developed as needed during the design phases.
 - The district is in the process of developing an HVAC (heating and cooling) committee. If you have knowledge and/or expertise in this area and you are interested in serving on this committee, please contact Dr. Traci McCaudy at 419.334.5432.
 - The district will be interviewing commissioning agents for this project at the end of the month. The commissioning agent will work with the district and construction manager on the design and installation of the HVAC system. The Ohio School Facilities Commission requires the hiring of the commissioning agent and monies have been budgeted for this position.
 - The Core Team continues to meet monthly and committee meeting minutes are located on the district's website at www.fremont.schools.net.
 - The district sold \$9.5 million in notes on 12-23-08 to be used toward the construction project. These notes may be converted on or before Sept. 23, 2009 depending upon the Bond Market.
 - The District sold the remaining \$9.135 million in bonds on 1-14-09.
