Child Find: Early Intervention and Collaboration

Every child in this country is entitled to a free, public education. The law applies to handicapped children as well, regardless of their handicap, or the severity of the handicap. Please call us if you suspect your child has a handicap. We can help – but we must first find the child. Fremont City Schools provides services to students with disabilities. We also work collaboratively with the Help Me Grow program which assists families with early identification and services for children under the age of three, and we have a collaborative agreement with the Sandusky County DD early childhood and school-age programs provided through the School of Hope. Building the Dream Together: FCS K-12 College Awareness and Preparation Plan

The dream of going to college or planning for additional training past high school is available to <u>every</u> student that walks through our doors. That is the focus of the plan that FCS will implement during the 2010-2011 school year. Parents registering their children for Kindergarten will receive a college prep checklist, parents of 4th, 5th and 6th grade students will be invited to individual conferences during the year to look at student interests, discuss information from Ohio colleges and future funding options to pursue. FMS students will complete a career interest template, research specific colleges of interest, visit the Tech Center, Vanguard, BGSU and UT, participate in a Financial Literacy/Career Readiness class and start "banking" money if they are eligible for the UT Scholarship program. Students at Ross will receive detailed information and coaching on how to fill out paperwork required to access grants, scholarships and college assessments earlier in their high school career. They will visit Terra CC and Heidelberg and review their career interests, options and choices each year with a final review before graduation.

There are many other pieces to this process and it works best when parents, students and school staff share the work. Together, we can achieve the dream. For more information, please contact the school counselor at your child's school.

Curriculum Corner

We live in a digital world. EnVision Math is an innovative math program designed for today's 21st Century learners and teachers. With this math program, students have online access to their textbooks from any computer with internet capability. Teacher materials are available online as well. There are many resources available to teachers including SMARTBoard activities ready to use. Each topic is introduced with an interactive video to get students excited about what they are going to learn.

EnVision Math provides visual concept development with every lesson. Each lesson contains a visual learning bridge which shows step-by-step pictures with explanations of the lesson concept. Research has shown that students benefit from seeing math ideas portrayed visually. These step-by-step visuals aid in student understanding

Envision Math offers a strong home-school connection supplying suggestions and activities for practice at home. Online accessibility from home for additional practice or the ability to review how the lesson was taught also provides a new dimension in the relationship between work in class and reviewing at home.

New League for Little Giants

The Fremont City Schools Board of Education approved the Little Giants entrance to the Three Rivers Athletic Conference (TRAC) during the board meeting Monday, August 2nd. Our Ross principal, Jose Hernandez, will serve a two-year term as President of this new league. New members of this conference include: Findlay, Fremont Ross, Lima Senior, Oregon Clay, Toledo Central Catholic, Toledo Notre Dame, Toledo St. Francis, Toledo St. Johns, Toledo St. Ursula, and Toledo Whitmer. Due the situation resulting in schedule reductions with Toledo Public Schools, current Toledo City League (TCL) members decided to join other schools from Northwest Ohio to form a new 10-school conference. "It was a difficult decision for current Toledo City League members," said Hernandez. "However, the difficult financial situation that has forced Toledo Public Schools to make the cutbacks in athletics has altered the stability and quality of TCL. It is the intent our conference to leave the door open for further relationships with all TPS programs in the future."

The new TRAC conference schedule will begin with the fall sports of 2011. The name for the conference was selected due to its connection to all schools via Blanchard, Maumee and Sandusky rivers. A logo for the conference will be subject to each school submitting artwork and then a final decision will be made by the principals of the new conference.

The Facilities are Ready to Go!

The Department of Facilities & Operations has been very busy preparing the buildings for the 2010-2011 school year.

At Ross the natatorium lobby received a fresh coat of paint. Plastering and painting was done to repair the hallway leading to the art wing. Science rooms were updated for the return of chemistry and physics from the Tech Center to Ross High.

The Otis School parking lot has been sealed.

At Hayes the front steps and stoop were completely torn out and replaced. The flagpole in the front of Hayes was moved to accommodate a growing tree.

Steam traps were replaced at both Ross and Stamm. This process enables a more efficient steam heating system.

At Washington an elderly tree was removed from the property and crumbling plaster inside classrooms was repaired.

At Croghan tuck pointing around the chimney and windows was completed. The fence along Pennsylvania Avenue was replaced. Asphalt repair was completed in the Croghan parking lot and in the area where portables were removed. Topsoil and seed has been placed in the bare area once inhabited by portables/classroom units.

At Stamm, Washington, Lutz, Otis, Hayes and Atkinson the security pads have been upgraded. All buildings with the exception of the old middle school will have a complete security assessment conducted in order to develop a district upgrade plan.

Security cameras have been installed at the Hayes Elementary office and the district plan calls for cameras to be installed in all elementary offices by the first day of school.

Permanent improvement dollars have been used to complete these projects.

The Ohio Department of Natural Resources Grant project has also been progressing. This grant, attained through the Fremont Area Foundation, has provided sidewalks leading from the newly asphalted baseball/softball parking lot back to the concession stand. In addition, a tennis storage building has been built and sidewalk laid from the tennis parking lot leading to the tennis building.

Immunizations

All children entering kindergarten must have:

- Hepatitis B vaccine series of three
- A fifth dose of DTAP (diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis) if the fourth dose was given prior to the fourth birthday
- A fourth dose of polio vaccine if the third was administered prior to the fourth birthday
- Two doses of MMR (measles, mumps, rubella)
- Two doses of varicella (chickenpox)

All children entering 7th grade must have:

• Tdap (tetanus, diphtheria, pertussis) <u>OR</u> Td (tetanus, diphtheria) booster

Frequently Asked Questions and Answers

Question:

Why did the elementary school times change this year?

Answer:

The elementary buses were having difficulty dropping off elementary students to the buildings on time in the morning and picking up the elementary children at school at the end of the day. The fifteen minutes will allow the drivers more time to drop off and pick up students on schedule.

Question:

Will the FCS Board of Education review busing services again this year?

Answer:

Yes. The FCS Board of Education will review K-12 busing services, potential costs and its current budget this year in preparation for the 2011-2012 school year. We will keep everyone apprised of any busing changes. Last year a survey was distributed to parents of high school students for the purpose of projecting high school busing needs and costs. The survey results were extremely helpful and the information will be utilized during our study again this year.
