# Academics

The students at Stamm Elementary worked very hard preparing for the OAA tests this year. The fourth and fifth grade science classes teamed up to make their studying a little more exciting. Even though the fourth graders don't take a Science OAA this year, the fifth graders were helping to prepare them for next year. Students were given practice tests with extended response questions,



which require them to site evidence from a given passage. The fifth grade students were able to be the "teacher" and show the fourth graders what makes a quality two-point or four-point answer. ### **Hayes Students Learn Fab Four**

At Hayes Elementary, the Intervention Specialists, Title One teacher and selected grade level teachers team up to learn and implement comprehension strategies from nationally recognized literacy coach Lori D. Oczkus. These strategies are referred to as Reciprocal Teaching, and revolve around the complex comprehension thought process of making predictions, asking questions, using



clarifying strategies and summarizing reading selections. The "Fab Four" have been flexible and fun to implement and can be used in the primary and intermediate curriculum during whole group lessons, guided reading groups, literature circles, center activities and individual assignments. Some of these strategies incorporate lessons that allow students to use dance gestures, role play/theatrical roles, comprehension webs and game pieces to extend the comprehension thought process as they practice scaffolding, metacognition, cooperative learning and think-alouds through social interaction. Students who have participated in Reciprocal Teaching "Fab Four" Strategies have shown growth in their learning and are having tons of fun! The first grade classes at Lutz are focusing on all of the positive things that are happening in their classrooms and rewarding those behaviors. Each student has a clip with their name on it. At the beginning of each day, their clip starts in the green - "ready to learn" position on the behavior chart. They have the ability to move up three different colored spaces to the top

for awesome behavior through-

out the day. Each afternoon the



students color the date on the calendar to match where their clip ended that day, so their parents are able to keep track of how their child is doing at school, as well.

When the student is on "ready to learn" or above (good day, great day, outstanding), they receive a punch on their behavior punch card. Once the student has filled their card with ten punches, they redeem their card for a coupon from the "Best Behavior Prize Coupon Book." These coupons include rewards such as: no homework, take off your shoes for the day, bring in a stuffed animal, sit with a friend at lunch, jump in line anywhere, extra computer time, use the super-duper supplies and one of the class favorites – lunch with the teacher.

So far this year, over 400 coupons have been redeemed in the Lutz first grade. Mrs. Reynolds and Mrs. McAfee enjoy rewarding the students for being safe, respectful and responsible throughout the day.

#### **Football Tickets**

The start of another season of Little Giant football is quickly approaching. In order to provide the best fan experience for all, the following changes have been made for all varsity football contests and will go into effect this 2013 season:

*-General Admission Tickets*: The \$6.00 general admission tickets will only be sold at the Stamm entrance. Reserve tickets and student tickets can be purchased from either the Miller Street or Haynes Street entrances.

-Admission: Middle school students will no longer be permitted to enter the game without an accompanying adult. High School students will need to produce a school issued identification card in order to enter the contest without parental supervision. High school students who fail to bring their ID cards and FMS/elementary students who are not accompanied by a parent will not be granted access to the game.

-*Student Section*: Middle school students will no longer be permitted to sit in the student section as was the practice in previous years. Only students in grades 9-12 along with members of the Ross High School marching band will be permitted to sit in the student section. Middle school students who attend the athletic contest should sit with their parents.

-2 *minute rule:* The rule which limited when students could leave the students section during the course of the event will no longer be enforced. Students who are seated in the student section of the stadium will be given the freedom to use the restroom or visit the concession stand at their discretion. If this practice is either abused or leads to further incident, it will be revoked.

As with every decision we make, these changes have been made in order to provide the safest and most favorable environment for both students and fans. We thank you in advance for your continued support of our football program and our many student-athletes.
