In the resource room at Lutz Elementary School, the students learn lessons in social and behavioral skills. This month, they have been learning to understand and accept those who may seem different from them. For the past two weeks, we focused on Autism Awareness. After learning about autism, and how it affects those in their school and in their community, a few of the students shared that they knew friends or family members living with autism. Then, the



students decided to bake and decorate blue frosted cookies for the Lutz staff in order to raise awareness about the worldwide "Light it up Blue for Autism" initiative. Throughout the unit, students learned to accept and appreciate people on the autism spectrum. They showed great interest in the topic, and because of this, we have invited two guest speakers to further educate them. One of the speakers is Fremont Middle School student Jacob Herr, the nephew of Intervention Specialist Erin Lawrence. Jacob is on the autism spectrum, and he plans to speak to the students about how he succeeds in music, art and academics. The other speaker is Tyler Aldrich, the son of Paraprofessional Tami Aldrich, who has become an excellent keynote speaker. Tyler also leads a full life, working and attending school at Terra State Community College, and he is living with autism. These lessons about understanding and accepting the differences of others will help the students throughout their lives when working and interacting with others. This will help them to display good character traits and the students will benefit from what they learned in one way or another.

Safe Routes to School



As part of the Safe Routes to School grant, safety programs and recreational opportunities have been created, piloted, and implemented throughout the District. Walk to School Day Events were piloted at three elementary buildings and pedestrian safety was addressed
