



FMS Suggested Study Habits for Success


Now, more than ever, it is important to keep your school work organized. The way we do school has had to change, and with that, it is important for FMS students to adjust as well. Being disorganized can have a negative effect on even the brightest students and often overshadows their potential success. In order to be successful, it is important for students to manage their time wisely and develop organizational skills, especially when working from home.

To create a successful study space at home, students just have to follow these simple steps:

- Store worksheets and other homework assignments in one folder so that they never go missing again.
- Turn your phone off (or switch it to airplane mode) to prevent text messages and notifications from interrupting your work.
- Stash pencils, highlighters, and other supplies in containers to keep your workspace mess-free. Less clutter = fewer distractions.
- Set up a schedule for your days at home. Set aside specific time to work on each of your classes. Include a time in your schedule for breakfast and lunch as well.
- Track assignments and due dates in a planner. Write it down so you don't forget!
- Use ProgressBook to track and monitor your grades.
- Use a plate when eating! Turning in homework with crumbs or food stains will NOT get you extra points!

The PAX Good Behavior Game is an evidence-based practice that we are beginning to implement during regular instructional time to encourage engagement, reduce disruptions, and help children to focus on the task at hand.

The increased self-regulation that children gain from using the PAX Good Behavior Game at school has shown to improve lifetime outcomes including: increased graduation and college entrance rates, increased lifetime earnings, decreased risk for drug abuse, and decreased risk for mental, emotional and be-

havioral disorders. PAX increases peace, productivity, health and happiness for every community.

Transitioning and change has been something everyone has been doing in our recent situation with the pandemic. Ross High School is no different. Some students are adapting to the at-home learning with the learning platform, SchoolsPLP, while others are coming to school with the hybrid model. While these changes and expectations can become tedious, students and staff are doing their best to stay true to the guidelines so they can stay healthy while learning.




