FMS Preparing for the OAT

Students on Eagle Team 7C have been busy working on various topics and strategies to prepare for the OAT. Each day, our students are given enriching opportunities to implement these strategies into their assigned tasks in all core areas. Our standards driven curriculum, as well as our assessment driven instruction, allows our students the chance to succeed in their classes.



The students have also been given a special opportunity to be taught by a pre-service teacher from Bowling Green State University. Mrs. Brandy Ivy brings a refreshing perspective to our students. She is energetic and has many wonderful ideas to share with our students. Your children are fortunate to have this chance to work with such an excellent pre-service teacher.

Learning Study Skills

Fourth grade students at Croghan Elementary are learning study skills with Miss Warren! Miss Warren is our school counseling intern here at Croghan, under supervision of Susan Moxley, and has been working with students on a number of topics including peer mediation, friendship, dealing with grief, and bullying. The group she is currently working with is focused on study skills, lowering test anxiety, time management, and organization.

Students in this small group learn these skills in a variety of different ways. For example, one activity is deciphering "Busy Betty's Week". Students are given a schedule of what "Betty"; a fourth grader does in a week. The students then manage her time by what NEEDS to be done and what Betty WANTS to do. After, the students then apply this concept to their own lives and learn time management skills. So far this group has been very effective.



Curriculum Corner

We're Ready for the Ohio Achievement Tests!

A primary purpose for all assessments is to focus our attention on learning while continually monitoring the academic progress that students make throughout the year. These state-designed tests begin after Spring break. As one of the ways that we measure the progress of our students, it is also one way that our district is measured against other Ohio districts. Here's the testing schedule: **April 21:** Reading grades 3-8; **April 23:** Math grades 3-8; **April 27:** Writing grades 4 & 7; Science grades 5 & 8; **April 29:** Social Studies grades 5 & 8.

Every day throughout the school year, teachers and students are working on the learning process. Teachers build many strategies into their lessons so that each child's needs are considered. Teachers use the lists of required standards and skillfully meld them into "teachable moments." Students bring anticipation to the learning environment. They want to know, "what will be new and different about today and why do I need to learn it?" Teachers strive for creativity and relevance; and they encourage our students to learn. Our teachers and students are excited and ready to show what they know!

From the desk of Superintendent Dr. McCaudy

Dear Fremont Community:

Two years ago the Fremont City School District conducted a community perception survey regarding Fremont's schools. Survey respondents strongly supported the need for full-day kindergarten, indicating that they felt a full-day program would enhance the district's overall academic performance.

Educational research validates the respondents' findings. Children attending full-day kindergarten programs consistently outperform their counterparts in half-day programs nationwide. In Ohio specifically, full-day programs are necessary if children are to meet the state's challenging academic standards. Unfortunately, district budget constraints in previous years prevented Fremont from implementing a full-day kindergarten program.

This past school year the district has been researching the costs associated with full-day kindergarten programming. Recently the federal government announced that the district will be receiving stimulus funds that can only be used for initiatives that will increase student achievement.

I am very pleased to inform you that Fremont City Schools will utilize general and federal stimulus funds to offer full-day kindergarten programming at all buildings effective with the beginning of the 2009-2010 academic year.

Kindergarten registration is scheduled for May at each of the elementary schools. If a child will be 5 years old on or before August 1, 2009, he or she is eligible to start Kindergarten during the 2009-2010 school year.
